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HISTORICAL

The practice of Ash Wednesday dates back to the 11th Century,

Lent (Latin: Quadragesima, 'Fortieth') beginning with Ash Wednesday is a solemn observance commemorating the 40 days Jesus spent fasting in the desert and enduring temptation by Satan, according to the Gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke, before beginning his public ministry.

The tradition of receiving ashes has even earlier roots

— to the ancient Hebrew custom of clothing oneself
in sackcloth and dusting oneself with ashes as a sign
of penance.

In the book Daniel Chapter 9: in the nine chapter there's a line about associating fasting with ashes, so ashes are associated with penance.

Daniel's Prayer

⁴ I prayed to the Lord my God and confessed: "Lord, the great and awesome God, who keeps his covenant of love with those who love him and keep his commandments, ⁵ we have sinned and done wrong. We have been wicked and have rebelled; we have turned away from your commands and laws. ⁶ We have not listened to your servants the prophets, who spoke in your name to our kings, our princes and our ancestors, and to all the people of the land.

⁷ "Lord, you are righteous, but this day we are covered with shame—the people of Judah and the inhabitants of Jerusalem and all Israel, both near and far, in all the countries where you have scattered us because of our unfaithfulness to you. 8 We and our kings, our princes and our ancestors are covered with shame, Lord, because we have sinned against you. ⁹ The Lord our God is merciful and forgiving, even though we have rebelled against him; 10 we have not obeyed the Lord our God or kept the laws he gave us through his servants the prophets. ¹¹ All Israel has transgressed your law and turned away, refusing to obey you.

Biblical Theology behind Liturgy

The service will focus on repentance, grace, and forgiveness.

The readings include warnings from Isaiah about fasts that God loves. That God wants us to free the oppressed and to walk in justice. They will include Christ commanding us not to do our fasting to be seen by others.

The service will remind us that we are mortal, and that we must repent. The service will be reverent and quiet. It is intended to be plain and simple.

During the service, you will be called upon to join with the whole Church in a Holy Lent. To pray that God will open our eyes to see that we can be honest with him, and repent. To see that we can tell him of our pain, and sorrow, and that he understands. He knows because Christ, God himself in the flesh, walked through his own wilderness, and then walked beyond that to the cross.(Common Prayer 2016)

INTRODUCTION TO ASH WEDNESDAY (Common Worship 2016)

Brother and sisters in Christ, since the early days, Christians have observed with great devotion the time of our Lord's passion and resurrection and prepared for this by a season of penitence and fasting.

By carefully keeping these days Christians take to heart the call to repentance and the assurance of forgiveness proclaimed in the gospel and so grow in faith and in devotion to our Lord.

I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting and self-denial; and by the reading and mediating on God's holy Word.

Where to get Ashes?

When then can the worshippers be informed to return the palms crosses given the previous year?

This can be done when the lectionary indicates <u>Sundays before</u> <u>Lent.</u>

Septuagesima Sunday, Sexagesima Sunday, and Quinquagesima Sunday

Announcements be made in Church to remind worshippers to return the old palm crosses

Ashes can also be purchased, but the very act of doing it in our respective churches becomes an act of preparations by involving people such as the Deacons, vergers and servers.

SERMON THEMES PRE-LENT

3rd Sunday before lent:

"justly punished"

2nd Sunday before lent Sunday:

"put not our trust in anything that we do"

Sunday before Ash Wednesday

"all our doings without charity are nothing worth."

(because you need to hear it). Take those things in mind, take them to heart, then take them into Lent with you. You're being formed by the Liturgy.

THINGS YOU NEED TO PREPARE ASHES

Old Palms: Traditionally, the ashes for the Ash Wednesday service are made by burning the palms from the previous year's Palms.

Fine mesh sieve:

Bowl: A appropriate container with a cover is needed to place the palm ashes.

Pynx should be appropriate so that it can be placed in one hand and wide enough or you might have difficulty reaching in with your thumb to get the ashes

Sourcing for something local will be cheaper that try to buy one from overseas.

Olive oil

Teaspoon

Clean cloth

Lemon juice.

How to prepare Ashes?

Step 1

Burn all the old palm leaves and branches.

Sift the ashes into a bowl using a fine mesh sieve using the back of a teaspoon to push the ashes through the mesh.

Step 2

Add one or two drops of olive oil to the ashes in the bowl and mix with a teaspoon. Mix the ash and oil until the ash begins to stick together, the mix should have a paste like consistency. Add oil until the mixture is right. By adding the olive oil, you will find that the ashes are easy to apply and the worshipper will find it easy to wipe it off their foreheads without getting ashes all over their face, hands and clothing.

Do this night before the service begins.

Step 3

Cover the ash and oil paste with plastic wrap until ready to use to prevent anything from falling in and contaminating the mixture.

How to impose the ashes?

- Dip your right thumb into the container, just touching the surface of the ashes so that the edge of your thumb is black.
- Draw a cross on the person's forehead with your thumb. It will probably come out looking like a plus sign.
- Say Remember that dust you are, and to dust you shall return, which comes from Genesis 3:19, or words to that effect. Say the same thing for each person.
- The person does not need to respond, but if they say amen, it does not mean that their life will end.
- The person immediately returns to their seat, and it is the next person's turn.

Step 4

Remember to put a wet cloth around in a dish and place it on the credence table. Put a small hand towel or wet tissue next to it.

Tip

Wipes the ashes off using a clean dry cloth. Use a few drops of lemon juice to clean the skin, if the ashes doesn't wipe off completely

Warning.

Never mix palm ashes with water or use water to clean the ash mark off skin. Palm Ash mixed with water can burn the skin.

HOW TO USE ASHES ON ASH WEDNESDAY?

The practice of marking with the sign of the cross to the forehead of palm ash and oil on Ash Wednesday provides a visible sign which marks the beginning of the season of Lent.

The mark is an outward sign of the believer's repentance and commitment to renewal of their faith. The actual act is referred to as the "imposition of ashes."

The priests mix palm ash with a drop of oil and apply a sign of a cross to the worshipper's forehead. The person is then to wear the mark until it naturally rubs off, although it is acceptable in most faith communities to remove the mark the next morning.

The purpose of this rite is to remind people that we will one day die and thus the need for repentance.

Imposing the Ashes

When do you impose the ash on the Forehead in the service?

After the confession of sins, everyone stands in line in the aisle, and the first person is piously standing in front of you waiting to receive the ashes. In some churches they prefer to kneel and receive the ashes.

Collect

Collect (1)Ash Wednesday and lent

Almighty and everlasting God, you hate nothing you have made and forgive the sins of all who are penitent:

Collect (2)

Create and make in us new and contrite hearts, that we, worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our wretchedness, may obtain of you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness;

Collect (3)

through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Litany of Penitence (please kneel)

Litany (1)

Most holy and merciful Father: We confess to you and to one another, and to the whole communion of saints in heaven and on earth,

Litany (2)

that we have sinned by our own fault in thought, word, and deed; by what we have done, and by what we have left undone

Litany (3)

We have not loved you with our whole heart, and mind, and strength. We have not loved our neighbours as ourselves. We have not forgiven others, as we have been forgiven.

All: Have mercy on us, Lord.

Litany (4)

We have been deaf to your call to serve, as Christ served us.

We have not been true to the mind of Christ. We have grieved your Holy Spirit.

All: Have mercy on us, Lord.

Litany (5)

We confess to you, Lord, all our past unfaithfulness: the pride, hypocrisy, and impatience of our lives,

Litany (6)

Our self-indulgent appetites and ways, and our exploitation of other people,

Litany (7)

Our anger at our own frustration, and our envy of those more fortunate than ourselves,

Litany (8)

Our intemperate love of worldly goods and comforts, and our dishonesty in daily life and work,

Litany (9)

Our negligence in prayer and worship, and our failure to commend the faith that is in us,

Litany (10)

Accept our repentance, Lord, for the wrongs we have done:

for our blindness to human need and suffering, and our indifference to injustice and cruelty,

All: Accept our repentance, Lord.

Litany (11)

For all false judgments, for uncharitable thoughts toward our neighbours, and for our prejudice and contempt toward those who differ from us,

All: Accept our repentance, Lord.

Litany (12)

For our waste and pollution of your creation, and our lack of concern for those who come after us,

All: Accept our repentance, Lord.

Litany (13)

Restore us, good Lord, and let your anger depart from us;

All: Favorably hear us, for your mercy is great.

Litany (14)

Accomplish in us the work of your salvation,

All: That we may show forth your glory in the world.

 Priest: Make our Hearts clean O God.

• All: And renew a right spirit with us.

Father eternal, giver of light and grace, we have sinned against you and against our neighbour,

In what we have thought,
In what we have said and done
Through ignorance and through
weakness,

Through our deliberate fault.

We have wounded your love,
And marred your image in us.
We are sorry and ashamed
And repent of all our sins.

For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ Who died for us,

Forgive us all that is past: and lead us out from darkness to walk as children of Light.

Amen

• Priest: May Almighty God pardon and absolves all those who truly repent, in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Imposition of ashes

By the cross and passion of your Son our Lord,

All: Bring us with all your saints to the joy of his resurrection.

<u>Invitation</u>

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ, I invite you to receive these ashes as sign of the spirit of penitence with which we shall keep this season of Lent.

> Silence is then kept for a time, all kneeling.

Almighty God, you have created us out of the dust of the earth: Grant that these ashes may be to us a sign of our mortality and penitence, that we may remember that it is only by your gracious gift that we are given everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen.

God have mercy on you,


pardon you and set you free.
